A personal reflection from your Chairperson - after the AGM. First of all, I want to thank everybody who was involved in any way with the meeting – helpers with logistics, including packing up at the end; morning tea servers; people who wrote reports; people who asked questions and thereby helped us form up a way forward; people who accepted nomination for positions of service for next year. And of course, everybody who was there – how would we have such an important meeting without you? I thought it was a very satisfying meeting; yes, it was long, but a great deal was achieved.

It's appropriate also to again thank the people who have served in a variety of ways for many years and who are not continuing into 2019: I think particularly of Geoff with his Property oversight, including a number of Planned Giving programmes; Tim with his financial and property expertise; Margaret and Dene for several years supporting the BTeam; Alwynne who was a liaison person with Mission support for many, many years.

They are but few, of course, of the many people in our congregation and in the wider church who have devoted a lifetime of service to God through their local church and wider. As church demographics are changing, it seems we are just beginning to realise the scale of the contribution of our life-long servants of the church, and maybe we have taken you for granted. I need to apologise if you feel that we have done that to you.

I also had cause to reflect into Monday and even into Tuesday on what a wonderful community we have here at Seacliff. You heard a report about the Presbytery / Synod meeting: the combative and confrontational atmosphere was just so draining. (I had not realised how much that had been so for me until I found that I had no mental energy to do stuff on Monday afternoon — and had to give up trying!) It was such a relief to walk in last Sunday morning and be surrounded by people working together for our shared purpose. Yes, we have to work at maintaining community, and yes, we will need reminders from time to time about being more consciously thoughtful and inviting for people visiting.

But even with our periodic short-comings and slip-ups, it seems to me that we are at least trying, and mostly managing, to develop a community of the people of God in this place, per the Gospel of Luke: good news for those in need, liberty for captives, sight for the blind, the oppressed set free – because the Lord is saving his people.

Now there are some things needing to be done:

- There's a long list of special events occurring next year: I'll advertise them as they get closer.
- We do need a coordinator for Pastoral Care (which overlaps with Small Groups).
- We do need a coordinator for the church office.
- It would be great if we had a rep to attend Network meetings alongside the minister and chairperson. Church Council will address those matters to as necessary. And we will need to meet early next year to decide formally on our Mission Project for 2019.

Sorry this has turned into a bit of a sermon, but it was provoked by my experiences of last Sunday and the three days before. I just want to say what a delight it is to be a member of this congregation, to give and receive friendship and encouragement and spiritual support. Last week's experiences make me appreciate all the more the community we are building here with our worship, our small groups, and special events like the Big Book Sale, the election stalls and Craft and Hobbies Fair. Thank you for your continuing support.

Pray to God for the vision to remain clear and an inviting, respectful and open community to continue to grow.
